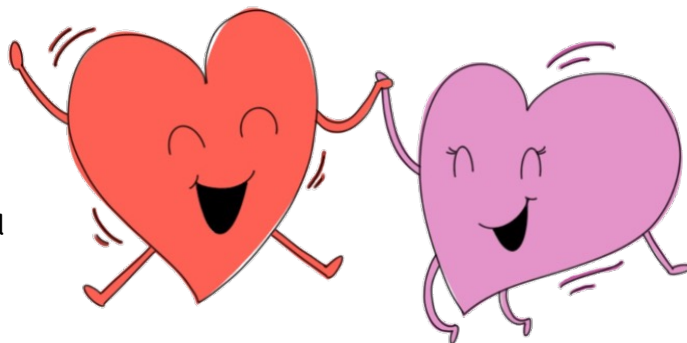

We have begun our re-enrollment and lottery registration process for the 2023-2024 school year. Re-enrollment of your student will ensure that their spot is not released and offered to a new applicant through the lottery in March. If you do not plan to return next year, please also complete the process so that we know how many open positions we have available to new students next year.

READING REMINDER

We have many RA students who are strong and accomplished readers, but we also have many 'up and coming' readers who are struggling and need regular and consistent practice to develop vital reading fluency and comprehension skills needed for life. We have implemented a new elementary reading program where our students in K-5 are reading in small groups with our aides and teachers everyday for 30-45 minutes targeting specific skills to help each student achieve their goals. This is not enough. Please make time every day to read with your child. This will help them to develop a love of books and the desire to read independently for enjoyment. Reading practice can look like many things - Story time, letters/sound practice, taking turns reading alternative lines/paragraphs/pages, independent reading, levelled readers, reading along to an audio book etc. Feel free to reach out to our classroom teachers or Tracy Scott, our school reading specialist if you need any tips, tricks or ideas for activities that will help your child learn to read.

What is your favorite thing about teaching? My favorite thing about teaching is the moment when a student understands something they have been struggling with. It's so exciting to see the moment when it clicks.

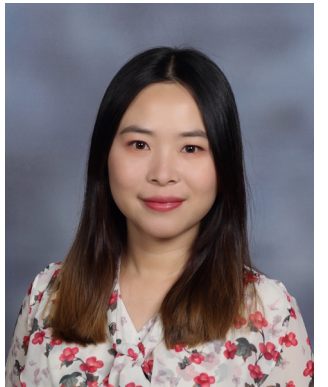
WENDY (DI) WU, MS CHINESE TEACHER

READING CORNER

We have just finished our MOY (middle of year) DIBELS assessments for reading and math. The students are starting to recover from the COVID years and things feel more normal. That being said, the students are behind and need a lot of extra support this year. We are doing all we can to help them with their studies here at school. You can also help them at home, especially with their reading skills.

You will get a report on how your student is doing with their reading at SEP's. Whether they are soaring or struggling, making sure your student reads at home for 20 minutes every day is crucial. You should have them read to you at least twice a week to be sure that they are reading books that are just right for them (not missing more than 5 words on a chapter book page).

If they cannot yet read, read to them. Ask them about the pictures and what they think will happen next. Students who can read should also be quizzed about the books they are reading. A little help with reading at home will go a long way in getting everyone reading at their best.
