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DEAN'S MESSAGE

Dear Renaissance Parents & Guardians,

September is 'Attendance Awareness Month' here in Utah. Please remember that school attendance each day matters! To gain an optimal education and maximize their learning experience it is vital for your student to be punctual and attend school every day. Students who are chronically late or absent miss out on crucial instruction, grade level content, and participation in required classroom activities. Utah defines 'Chronic Absenteeism' as 'a student who misses 10% of school in a year, whether from excused, or unexcused absences, and has been registered for at least 60 days is chronically absent.' This is equivalent to a student missing school twice a month. Please remember that when your student is absent that the learning they miss adds up very quickly!

When you as a parent decide to take your student out of school please remember;

- 1. Chronic absenteeism causes children to fall behind academically, reduces teacher effectiveness and prevent students from achieving their educational goals.
- 2. Chronic absenteeism in kindergarten negatively correlates and impacts academic performance in first grade.
- 3. Chronic absenteeism means your student is consistently missing content instruction, falling behind on homework/classroom assignments, and playing 'catch-up'.
- 4. Chronic absenteeism prevents your student from interacting with their same-age peers and learning valuable lifelong social and relationship skills.
- 5. Chronic absenteeism shows a reduction in GPA, Math, Language and Science scores.
- 6. Chronic absenteeism can be an early predictor of dropping out of high school.
- 7. Chronic absenteeism can reduce the likelihood of post-secondary enrollment in education.
- 8. Chronic absenteeism means your student is not gaining the best education possible to help prepare them for life.

Please help your student understand how important it is for them to attend school every day. We understand there are circumstances such as illness when students should not attend school and we ask you to keep them at home for their own well-being as well as the safety of others. Please refrain from keeping your student away from school unless absolutely necessary. If your student/s is or will be absent please let us know by completing our online 'excused absence' information form. This can be found at http://renacademy.org/excuse_student_absence.html

If you plan in advance for your student to be absent from school please also contact their teacher to find out what school work they will miss and will need to make up as a result of the absence. If you plan in advance for your student/s to be away from school for two or more consecutive days for whatever reason please inform both the teacher and myself at smccappin@renacademy.org

Parents please carefully review our RA Student Attendance and Punctuality policy included in this weeks RAPP. Please note, if your student is regularly tardy or absent from school you will be contacted to find out the circumstances surrounding the absence. Please remember that you have a legal responsibility to ensure your child regularly attends school. Thank you for your support and dedication to your students education. Declaration

Micross, regular school attendance is essential to successful student achievement and graduation because teaching and learning are hindered when the student is not present in the classroom;

Interest, chronic absenteeism—defined as being absent more than ten percent of school days—frequently indicates the student's potential to struggle academically, dropout out of school, or engage in delinquent behavior, as well as serves as a sign that something may be disrupting the student's life, providing an opportunity to intervene with counseling or other forms of support;

Interess, chronic absenteeism affects all students negatively by reducing instruction time, exacerbating the achievement gap between truant students and their peers, and undermining efforts to improve academically struggling schools;

Interest, chronic absenteeism may affect low-income and minority students particularly severely because they are more likely to lack academic and technological resources to compensate for lost time in the classroom, and are often challenged with systemic barriers to attending school regularly, such as unreliable transportation, lack of access to health care, or unstable housing or homelessness;

Interes, chronic absenteeism can be significantly reduced when schools, parents, and communities work together to monitor and promote regular school attendance and address barriers or issues that contribute to the problem; and

Interest, the state of Utah encourages efforts to increase public awareness of the importance of students' regular school attendance throughout grades K-12 in order to ensure that all children have the opportunity to succeed academically;

What is Chronic Absenteeism?



Utah's Definition: A student who misses 10% of school days in a year, whether from excused, or unexcused absences, and has been registered for at least 60 days is chronically absent.

ATTENDANCE MATTERS

RENAISSANCE ACADEMY STUDENT ATTENDANCE & TARDY POLICY

PHILOSOPHY

To fulfill Renaissance Academy's goal of educating the whole child in a collaborative learning environment, regular and punctual attendance is vital to the teaching-learning process. Regular attendance and punctuality develops patterns of behavior and important skills essential to success in the workplace and life. At RA student attendance and punctuality is viewed as critically connected to student success. Students must be present and punctual to maximize their learning and achieve academic mastery, and to help their classmates likewise be successful.

ATTENDANCE STANDARDS

Students may not have more than five excused or unexcused absences per semester. For the purpose of this policy, semester dates will be established in the Renaissance Academy annual school calendar. Any unexcused absence, as defined below, shall be counted in this total.

1. Excused Absences

The following are excused absences: student illness, family death, approved school activity, absence permitted by a school-age minor's Individualized Education Program, or Section 504 Accommodation Plan. A parent may excuse an absence by sending a note or email within three school days to the school enrollment specialist explaining the reason for the absence. Seven or more days (or equivalent class periods) of 'excused absence' within a school year are considered excessive and we will require a doctor's note to excuse subsequent absences. Students may be required to make up work for excused absences. Parents or students who know of an absence in advance, should complete a pre-excused absence form. This form will allow students to collect work they will miss due absence in advance.

2. Unexcused Absences

Any absence not excused, as defined above, or any absence exceeding the state allowable total of five per semester (two terms) is considered unexcused. Teachers will not be required to provide make-up work for unexcused absences.

ENFORCEMENT OF SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

Formal letters of notification regarding student attendance and unexcused and/or excessive absence from school will be sent to parents/legal guardians as outlined below:

- 3rd absence A notice will be mailed asking for the parent's help with the student's attendance and warning of consequences for further truancy.
- 4th absence Administration will request a meeting with the parents/legal guardian.
- 5th absence Administration will develop an attendance contract with the parents/legal guardian.
- 6th absence Administration will initiate additional measures to correct ongoing attendance problems which may include but is not limited to after school detention.

ATTENDANCE MATTERS

• 10th absence – The school will mail the student and parents a Habitual Truancy Notice/Pre-Court Hearing letter. The Habitual Truancy Notice requires student and parents to attend a pre-court hearing. Students may be assigned a truancy fee. A referral will be made to the juvenile courts for students in 7th-9th grades. Parents/legal guardians of students ages 6-12 (K-6 grades) may be referred to the Utah County District Attorney.

TARDINESS

Every student is expected to be punctual for school. Tardiness results in a student missing necessary instruction and results in the interruption of their class. A student is considered tardy if they arrive at school any time after the bell rings commencing school at 8 am. Students who arrive within ten-minutes of school starting (i.e., before 8:10 am) should report straight to class and are marked tardy by their classroom teacher. If a child is more than ten-minutes late to school, the parent must sign the student in at the front desk or provide the office with a note. If there is a valid reason for the tardiness, please explain the reason in the note. Students arriving without parent check-in or note will automatically receive an unexcused tardy. The student must obtain a tardy slip before going to the classroom.

More than three tardies in a two-week period to school or to class periods throughout the day (for Middle School students) are considered excessive and will result in parent / guardian contact regarding excessive tardiness. The classroom teacher will send an email home to the students' parents / guardian in elementary grades indicating the student is regularly and excessively tardy. If punctuality does not improve the teacher may elect to invite the parents / guardian to meet and discuss the impact of tardiness on student learning. Middle School students who are tardy to school in the morning or class periods throughout the day based on their teachers classroom tardy policy will receive after-school detention. Middle School parents will be notified by email regarding their students 'Tardy' detention. Middle School students who do not attend this detention without a written parental exemption request will be required to attend an extra penalty detention.

Parents and/or guardians of students who are consistently late for school may be contacted by the students classroom teacher or administration to discuss the ramifications of tardiness on student learning and achievement. Students who consistently miss learning opportunities and lessons due to tardiness or absence may be required to complete additional make up assignments or attend alternate learning opportunities to fill learning gaps.

RELEASE OF STUDENTS DURING SCHOOL HOURS

Students are discouraged from leaving school during school hours. In the event that it is absolutely necessary, please send a note to the teacher regarding the early dismissal. Children will be released only to the parent/guardian or to those family members or adults designated on the emergency information form. Parents/guardians must come to the office, not the classroom, to collect children who will then be called to the office. The person who is checking the student out requires photo identification. Parents/Guardians, please do not send unauthorized individuals to check your students out. For the safety of your children and students, this policy will be strictly enforced. Children may not leave school grounds until they have been signed out at the school office.
